

Bryan K Richmond, MD, MBA, is Vice Chair and Professor of Surgery and the William J. Maier Endowed Chair of Research of the West Virginia University Charleston Division Department of Surgery. After receiving his medical degree from West Virginia University, Dr. Richmond completed a general surgery residency at the West Virginia University Charleston Division and a Masters in Business Administration from West Virginia University as well. He has a very broad based general surgery practice with an emphasis on both complex hernia repair and endocrine surgery. Dr. Richmond's research interests include predictors of outcomes in surgery for functional gallbladder disorders, complex abdominal wall reconstruction, and thyroid cytopathology.
